
# FACT OR FICTION?

- 1. SEX TRAFFICKING IS ONLY A FEMALE ISSUE.
- 2. THE TRAFFICKING VICTIMS PROTECTION ACT (TVPA) STATUTE INCLUDES LAWS FOR MEN TRAFFICKING VICTIMS.
- 3. THERE WERE 15 CIVIL AND CRIMINAL SEX TRAFFICKING CASES THAT WERE FILED IN U.S. FEDERAL COURTS BETWEEN 2000 AND 2020, WHERE AT LEAST ONE, IF NOT ALL THE VICTIMS, WERE BOYS.
- 4. THE VULNERABILITIES OF MALES AND FEMALES ARE THE SAME IN HUMAN TRAFFICKING SITUATIONS.

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# THE TRUTH IS, TRAFFICKING IS A SOCIETAL ISSUE AND MALES ARE ALSO TARGETS.



#### **ANSWERS:**

- 1. **Fiction:** The truth is, trafficking is a societal issue and males are also targets. Males are targets both of labor and sex trafficking. In sex trafficking, males may even be "softer" targets than women, because rarely do men speak about this abuse. Many cultures tend to discourage males from displaying emotions or vulnerability because those attributes are considered weak and feminine. In the media, female vulnerability is highlighted, while male vulnerability gets obscured by expressions of male dominance. Many young boys grow up hearing "suck it up," "men do not cry," "do not be a girl," or "be a man" when it comes to vulnerability, emotions, and pain. Unfortunately, these are statements they take into adulthood that can create barriers for male victims in disclosing their exploitation. The female-victim and male-perpetrator paradigm also contributes to low identification rates of male victims. When males are included in the discussion on sex trafficking, they are usually discussed as the perpetrators, not the victims.
- 2. **Fact**: The law is gender-neutral regarding who can be a victim of sex trafficking.
- 3. **Fiction:** There were 35 cases filed. The number of cases has grown over the last 15 years.
- 4. **Fact and Fiction:** There are some common vulnerabilities shared by males and females. These vulnerabilities included:
  - substance dependency
  - · child abuse
  - identifying as LGBTQ+
  - limited English proficiency
  - undocumented or irregular immigration status
  - homelessness

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### There are several common themes that effect men and boys more often:

- ·Black and brown males and gay men are notably at higher risk for trafficking. Male victims commonly face the fear of being judged for their sexual identity, whether they identify as LGBTQ+ or fear the ramifications of being perceived as such. Male victims who identify as LGBTQ+ may be reluctant to disclose their sexual exploitation for fear of discrimination, retribution, or blame that their sexuality got them into the situation. Because of this stigma, many male victims may decide not to disclose their sexual exploitation.
- ·Younger males are contacted more through **gaming systems**. Specifically, games for international audiences.
- ·Male victims commonly face the **lack of resources** to help them exit a trafficking situation and address their various needs to allow them to thrive. Male survivors are often faced with limited services specifically for male survivors of sex trafficking. With over 120 human trafficking organizations that offer housing and support only a hand full include male survivors. Male and female victims alike have basic needs such as housing, food, and clothing. If these needs and others are not being met, boys and men are going to continue to be vulnerable to sex trafficking as they look to traffickers to meet those needs. In sex trafficking, this is referred to as survival sex. Victims will exchange sex for food, shelter and other needed items. (Cont.)

Male human trafficking is an issue everywhere, including southwest Oklahoma. Conceptions about sex trafficking have been formed, promoted, and viewed through news reports, movies, public awareness programs, academic literature, and criminal statutes as a crime only against women and girls. The truth is, it affects men and boys too. But there is something we can do about this issue. We can do something as a community, as a church and as individuals.

First, the church can start talking about it! Empower fathers, brothers, and sons to find their voices by pushing out the stigma surrounding male trafficking. While each victim has his own reason to remain silent about his situation, the root of many of these reasons comes down to this: our societies reinforce such ideas that males are "too strong" to become victims, and if they become one, then they're weak or foolish for not escaping. Having men talk about their experience with each other can help break the stigma and allow others to share and heal together.

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Second, the church can help by offering classes about pornography addiction. One in three men and one in four pastors are addicted to watching porn. This is a "silent sin" that no one in the church likes to discuss because so many are involved. But we know that pornography fuels and encourages human trafficking on many levels. Educating about this topic and offering support and resources, which The Red Cord has, can help break the stigma and bring more men to healing; whether it is from pornography addition, or other sexual abuse. It happens way more than people think.
